The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc.'s (DCF) Board of Directors is made up of volunteers from all corners of Dearborn County, supporting the Foundation's primary purpose of building permanent endowment funds to serve donors who have charitable interests.

There were 15 members of the board during 2015. Directors are elected for three-year terms beginning with the annual meeting held in January of each year with approximately a third of the terms ending each year. A director may serve a maximum of two full consecutive terms of service. The terms are staggered to provide continuity of experience.

Board members are elected by the board after it receives recommendations from the Board Development Committee which is charged with seeking talented leaders who are representative of the community.

Dear Friends:

The Dearborn Community Foundation (DCF) is proud to be the community's leader in building the philanthropic resources that make Dearborn County a great place to live, learn, work and play. The Foundation's board of directors and staff are pleased to provide an Annual Report to the Community to illustrate the significant impact that the Foundation has made in the lives of folks who live in our community over the past 18 years. Of course, the Foundation's significant positive impact wouldn't be possible without the generous support of its donors and dedicated volunteers.

This Annual Report shares the impact on our community that the Foundation has had through its endowments held, the grants and scholarships awarded, and our volunteers' efforts over the past year. Not only with words and financial figures, but also with photos we tell the story of the Foundation during 2015.

By way of the Dearborn Community Foundation, donors are able to impact our community by supporting causes close to home and close to their heart. We take seriously the responsibility to be good stewards of those donors' contributions and to invest them wisely.

Through the generosity of our donors, the Foundation was able to award 1.5 million in grants and scholarships in 2015 – making a difference in the lives of many people in our community by strengthening the work of many non-profits through grants and by providing aid to students in their post-secondary educational efforts.

In 2015, the Foundation offered the "Double Your Donation" endowment matching campaign for the eighth straight year. As it was in the previous seven years, the matching campaign continued to be highly successful with all funds matched. Since 2008, the contributions made during the campaigns have increased the Foundation's endowment for the community by nearly \$3.4 million! Endowed assets during the eight year period have increased 44 percent. The campaign has inspired new philanthropy with 46 new endowment funds being started during the eight years supporting educational needs of students in our county and other organizations that make a positive impact on the lives of community members. In addition, contributions to existing endowment funds have helped to strengthen many non-profit organizations that serve needs in the community. The success of the campaign emphasizes that many generous supporters share the Foundation's belief in the power of philanthropy with investing in the future by building endowment.

Beginning in August 2014, DCF offered another opportunity to help donors multiply their contributions: the Community Challenge Matching Campaign. Thanks to a generous \$500,000 contribution from Lilly Endowment, Inc., as part of its GIFT (Giving Indiana Funds for Tomorrow) VI Initiative, eligible contributions received a match up to \$2 for each \$1 contributed to endowment funds. The campaign was scheduled to run through March 2016, but DCF was successfully able to match all funds by November 2015. This was a fantastic opportunity for donors to make their contributions go even further to make a difference in Dearborn County. As part of the Campaign the Foundation was able to grow its Community Funds by nearly \$500,000! Over time as needs change and new challenges and opportunities present themselves Community Funds give DCF the ability to meet the changing needs in our community through grants that are awarded by the Board of Directors each year.

The Foundation continues to be very proud of the youth in our community that are part of our Youth Council now in its fourth year. They are involved and educated in the power of philanthropy for our community's future. Their fundraising efforts and community service have not only impacted our community by providing support to many charitable causes in our community but have instilled a deeper value of volunteerism in our Council members.

The Foundation is deeply committed to its role in strengthening the community through strong leadership in bringing people together around common challenges and opportunities. We accomplish this through our partnerships with donors, volunteers and non-profit organizations.

Our hope is that you will read this 2015 Annual Report to the Community and share it with family, friends and neighbors. We want you to share with others the exciting news of the Foundation's significant impact on our community and how we all can work together to increase Dearborn County's philanthropic resources.

DCF IS YOUR PARTNER IN PHILANTHROPY

The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) offers its services to donors and professional advisors to help them fulfill their philanthropic wishes and maximize their benefits. DCF is committed to making your charitable giving a pleasurable and easy experience. The Foundation can discuss various gift vehicles and help find the best gift methods to meet donors' charitable, financial and estate planning goals.

The Foundation with assets of \$17.6 million, administers 129 endowment funds. Each endowment fund is established by a separate agreement and is accounted for individually. The funds are designed to carry out the philanthropic dream of the founding contributors. The corpus of a fund is pooled with other funds for investment purposes. Distributions from the fund in the form of grants, scholarships, or payments to designated non-profit agencies are made each year.

Donors' wishes vary from the granting of scholarships in the name of a deceased loved one to designated and field of interest endowments that provide assistance to a particular non-profit organization or cause. By establishing an endowment, a donor can create a source of income for a fund's purpose in perpetuity.



DCF AWARDS \$1.5 MILLION IN GRANTS DURING 2015

Dearborn Community Foundation (DCF) awarded more than 150 grants totaling \$1.5 million to non-profit organizations in 2015. The grants support the needs/interests of the community in the fields of: Art, Culture and Humanities, Community and Public Benefit, Education, Environment and Animal Protection, Human Services, Public Safety and Youth Programs.

The Foundation considers awarded grants to be investments in our community. DCF grants benefit the community in a variety of ways. Projects range from equipment for the Cosmetology and Criminal Justice programs at the Southeastern Career Center and the support of the food pantries in Dearborn County to equipment upgrades and replacement for many of the local Fire/EMS departments and restoration of a historic pipe organ. These grants had a major impact on the lives of many people in our community.

The majority of Foundation funds awarded to non-profit organizations are discretionary grants for which DCF conducts a competitive review and decision-making process. These grants are administered by DCF through non-permanent grant programs. Generous contributions from both the City of Lawrenceburg and the City of Aurora provide the funding for the non-permanent grant programs. DCF's administration of the non-permanent programs helps both donors achieve their charitable goals. The remaining grants are awarded based on recommendations by donors and are paid out of endowment funds established by donors. Figures for total grants awarded in 2015 also include designated endowment fund distributions and grants administered by DCF for the Lawrenceburg School Endowment Corporation.




FOUNDATION AWARDS MORE THAN \$304,000 IN SCHOLARSHIPS

Through the generosity of donors, the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc., (DCF) was able to encourage higher education and lower the cost of post-secondary schooling for many in Dearborn County by awarding 201 scholarships totaling approximately \$304,000 in 2015.

LILLY ENDOWMENT COMMUNITY SCHOLARSHIP

The purpose of the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Program is to help raise the level of educational attainment in Indiana and to leverage further the ability of Indiana's community foundations to enhance the quality of life of the state's residents.

Since the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarships were first offered in 1998, the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) has been pleased to award the scholarships

to Dearborn County students graduating from high school. In 2015, DCF was eligible to nominate a recipient and alternates for one full-tuition scholarship. The Lilly Endowment, Inc. program provides scholarships for full tuition, required fees, and a special allocation of up to \$900 per year for required books and equipment for four years of undergraduate study on a full-time basis, leading to a baccalaureate degree at any Indiana public or private college or university accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

The 2015 Lilly Endowment Community Scholar: **Eric Harrington**, a graduate of East Central High School, is currently attending Indiana University. Eric is majoring in Biology and English.

JACOB AMBERGER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship was established in memory of Jacob Amberger, who was killed in an auto accident in October 2012. At the time, Jacob was a junior at East Central High School and was on his way to the school to play in the boys' soccer sectional final game. He was a third-year member of the ECHS Men's Soccer team and was one of the team captains. Jacob liked hanging out with his friends and being an Explorer with the Cheviot Police Department, as he was preparing to be a police officer. He will always be remembered for his warm hugs and big smiles. The recipient of the 2015 scholarship in the amount of \$500 was Johnathon Jutzi.

GREG ANDRES MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The Greg Andres North Dearborn Conservation Club Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of Greg "Big Man" Andres who died in an accident on February 12, 2010. Greg was a man with a big heart who would do whatever was needed to help his community. This scholarship was created to honor his memory and to encourage students to follow his example of helping others. **Cassandra Batta** of East Central High School and **Courtney Steele**, of Franklin County High School were each awarded a \$500 scholarship in 2015.

DR. LESLIE M. BAKER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

William was known as a hard working student and very patriotic man, who loved his country! His son Thomas established this scholarship in his father's memory and to honor a student who embodies the same qualities as William. 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MOTHER MEMORIALIZES SON, HELPS OTHERS 54 YEARS AFTER HIS TRAGIC DEATH

Donors often establish endowment funds in memory of a family member or a friend. This is a story of a mother memorializing her son and positively impacting other young people through a scholarship fund at the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc.

Ruth Gulley Gray sits in her living room staring at the black-and-white, framed photo of her son, Roger Gulley, and smiles. Then she shakes her head and says: "He was such a good boy. Everybody loved him. He always had a smile for everybody."

Ruth, Greendale, is now 90 years old. Roger would be 70, if it weren't for a terribly tragic fatal car crash in Aurora on an early Saturday morning in May of 1962. Roger, then 16, and a sophomore at Aurora High School, was a passenger in a car driven by a friend. The driver, Roger and another passenger, all teens, were all killed in a collision with a truck.

"Well, of course, it was awful," Ruth said. "He was just a boy starting to grow into a man. He had so much promise ahead of him."

In fact, Roger was like the All-American boy next door. He played football, basketball and baseball. He was a Boy Scout, just four merit badges away from earning his way to Eagle Scout, the highest level in Scouting. ... And he loved music and playing his trumpet or singing, Ruth said.

Over the years, Ruth often thought about ways to memorialize Roger. She wanted to

find a way for him to be remembered and to be honored and "for it to go on forever," she said. So in the early 2000s Ruth decided to establish a scholarship endowment fund at the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc., (DCF) in Roger's memory.

The first Roger Gulley Memorial Scholarship was awarded in 2009. The scholarship annually is awarded to a graduating senior at South Dearborn High School, who has demonstrated ability in music, either instrumental or vocal. The student doesn't have to study music in college, but must have an ability, and in Ruth's mind, a love for music.

"Roger loved music and he wanted others to love it too," she said. "He also would want students to reach their goals. It makes me feel so good to know that the scholarship is helping others. Roger would've loved this too!"

Eight Roger Gulley Memorial Scholarships have been awarded over the years. While the scholarship is not a large dollar amount, it has had a significant impact on those who receive it.

The Gulley Scholarship helped Isaac Bowers, a 2013 SDHS grad, to pay for part of his first year of college. Bowers, 21, a senior at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green, Ky., said he has even participated as a member of the WKU Redshirts, the university's premier men's A Cappella group. He is a meteorology major with a minor in geographic information sciences. "I'm no longer involved with the Redshirts, but I continue to make every attempt to broaden my cultural horizons by attending and participating in musical events brought to campus," Bowers said. The WKU campus is very close to Nashville, Tenn., so he also gets to attend incredible musical events without traveling far, he said. "I'm incredibly grateful for this scholarship. It's an honor to have received it."

Abigail Rinck received the Gulley Scholarship in 2014 says it and other scholarships helped her attend the school of her dreams: Hanover College. Rinck, 20, is a junior at Hanover majoring in Music and Chemistry.

"Music still plays a big role in my life," said Rinck. "Music is my personal form of expression, and I will never let go of that. I appreciate the Roger Gulley Memorial Scholarship so much."

Rinck says her former South Dearborn High School classmate and now fiancé, Austin Ridlen, also appreciates the scholarship. Ridlen was the 2015 recipient of the Gulley Scholarship. "We are both music majors, who plan to use our degrees to teach music therapy to people with developmental disabilities," she said.

So more than 50 years after Roger Gulley's tragic death, Ruth Gulley Gray smiles, knowing her son's name is on a scholarship that's helping other young people reach their goals and follow some of the same dreams he had. ... And, of course, she hopes they are smiling like Roger.

DCF YOUTH COUNCIL IS HELPING OTHERS

The DCF Youth Council continued help others in Dearborn County in 2015, as the 19 highschool age youth (grades 9-12) completed significant community service hours and raised funds to grow its DCF Youth Council Endowment Fund, which supports other worthy causes in the community.

The Youth Council, which is made up of youth from across Dearborn County, was established by DCF in 2012 to involve youth in a meaningful way in the philanthropic tradition, to encourage young people to give and serve in their community, and to make philanthropy a habit of the heart for future generations. The Council is self-sufficient and youth-ran with DCF staff and volunteers giving guidance and direction where needed. The Council is guided by the three ideals of giving and serving, leadership development, and community engagement.

Council members are nominated by individuals in the community and from recommendations by current Youth Council members. Council members exhibit qualities of energetic, caring and involved youth who want to better serve their community. It's important to note that young people in the community don't have to serve on the council to get involved in council activities.

Youth Council members are learning the value of philanthropy and that setting aside funds for the needs of future generations through endowment is vital. The DCF Youth Council Endowment Fund, which was established in 2012, has grown significantly through the hard work of the youth and DCF Program Director Denise Sedler. The endowment fund provides support for various needs in the community through grants recommended by the Youth Council. The DCF Youth Council Endowment Fund has grown to a value of nearly \$13,000. Youth Council members have input as to what they see are the needs from year to year through their grant recommendations from the fund.

In 2015, the Council presented its first grant from the DCF Youth Council Endowment Fund to the James B. Wismann Y.E.S. Home, a shelter for abused and neglected children and runaways in need of help. Presenting the \$125 grant to Y.E.S. Home officials showed the Council how its hard work raising funds for the endowment has paid off, said Sedler.

Since the first Youth Council 5K Run/Walk in 2013, the Council has raised a total of more than \$16,600, which includes the funds raised at four 5Ks and other smaller fundraisers. Through the fundraisers the Youth Council has added to the endowment and also provided support to worthy causes such as local food pantries and the Pregnancy Care Center. The Council raised a total of more than \$3,500 for six local food pan-

tries the first two years of the 5K. The Council raised nearly \$1,700 for the Lauren Hill Make A Difference Fund at DCF in 2015. In 2016, the Council split the \$3,215 in 5K proceeds 50-50 between the P.A.W.S. of Dearborn County Humane Center and the DCF Youth Council Fund.

Youth Council members also participate in community service projects, including volunteering time by shopping for needy families served by the Dearborn County Clearing House for Emergency Aid and sorting donations for the Children's Coalition for Christmas Toys. The Council has also volunteers to help the We Care Packages, Inc. with its mission to send care packages and cards to U.S. soldiers. In 2015, the youth completed a project called Connecting Generations "Scraps from the Past." Council members worked with senior citizens at the Dearborn Adult Center for several months to complete a scrapbook of stories from the past. Another community service project for the Council is the ongoing Pen-pal program with 7th and 8th grade students at St. Mary's and St. John's schools in Aurora. Council members interact with the younger students through letters, providing a type of mentorship.

"FRIENDS" OF THE FOUNDATION RECOGNIZED

strong involvement in the community. In 2015, DCF posthumously honored the late William K. Ewan, who passed away in August of 2015.

"Bill Ewan truly was a friend of the Foundation," said Fred McCarter, DCF Executive Director. "He

was always looking for a way to help us make a difference in our community."

Ewan, a local attorney, worked with DCF on many occasions to help a client or to encourage others to consider endowment at the Foundation. In 2005, Ewan helped the Foundation garner a new endowment fund that had been a trust at a local bank. The trust provided annual scholarships to a graduate of each of the three Dearborn County high schools. Since the trust department at the local bank was closing, he worked with DCF and the local Circuit Court to establish the trust as an endowment. That trust is now the Frank R. Longcamp Scholarship and it has provided nearly \$30,000 in scholarships to students since becoming at endowment at DCF.

"Thanks to the late Mr. Longcamp and to Bill Ewan, the scholarships will continue in perpetuity," McCarter said. "He saw the value in folks using endowment to fulfill their charitable wishes and he was a fine ambassador for the Foundation and many other organizations and causes in the Dearborn County community."

Ewan's wife, Naomi Ewan, and daughter, Andrea Ewan, established the William K. Ewan Memorial Fund in 2015. The donoradvised endowment fund will allow the Ewan's to recommend grants to charitable entities in Dearborn County in memory of Bill.

NON-TRADITIONAL SCHOLARSHIP HELPS STUDENT TOWARD GOAL OF DEGREE

Donors establish endowment funds to support many needs in our community, ranging from scholarships to help students complete their higher education and career goals to grants for charitable organizations and causes. The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) is sharing this unique story about a scholarship recipient to show how donors' actions can make an incredibly positive impact on others.

When April Fritch graduated from high school in her hometown of Michigan City, Ind., in the late 1970s college wasn't an option. Financial resources just weren't available. The emphasis was on getting a job and living on her own.

Fritch's situation is similar to many folks in the Dearborn County community. For one reason or another, they didn't attend college, or didn't complete their degree. Then they realize they need to do something to improve their lives or just want to attain the goal of a college degree.

Fritch, 55, Lawrenceburg, and a 30-year resident of Dearborn County, was the first recipient of the Women Empowering Women (wEw) Scholarship in 2010. The wEw scholarship was established by DCF to help empower the women of Dearborn County to improve their lives through education. It's the Foundation's desire to help the non-traditional female student who has not had the opportunity to attend college or to complete their post-secondary education started previously in life.

In Fritch's case, she had been in a sales career for 18 years and knew there was a good possibility that her company would go out of business before her working years would be done. So she decided in her late 40s that she would make the commitment to attend college and earn a degree.

"I knew going to college would be a financial struggle, but I was determined to have a college education, and along with a degree, the opportunity to become financially secure and pursue alternative choices," said Fritch. "I was determined to get a degree and stay debt-free, so I knew it was going to be a pay-as-you-go proposition."

Fritch immediately realized there weren't many scholarships out there for "middle-aged folks," she said. "I think the wEw scholarship and any scholarship available to middle-aged women or men is a great concept. It seems like there's thousands of scholarships out there for recent high school grads, but not much for people trying to reinvent themselves or just make their lives better due to whatever circumstances they may be experiencing."

Fritch received two scholarships for "non-traditional" students at DCF. First, she applied for an Ivy Tech Community College Scholarship at the Foundation. She was awarded an Ivy Tech scholarship in 2009. Then she learned about the new wEw scholarship and applied and was awarded that scholarship in its first year of existence in 2010.

Fritch started her trek to a college degree at the age of 48, three years before a career change that landed her as a sales person at Register Publications, the publisher of print and online newspapers in Southeastern Indiana and in Harrison, OH. She worked her way up to sales manager and is currently the General Manager of Register Publications, overseeing all aspects of the company's business in the region.

While Fritch had not earned her degree before her advancement to GM at Register Publications, she says her education at Ivy Tech and the knowledge she's received in school has gone a long way toward helping her grow as GM. She will earn her Associates Degree in Business Science at Ivy Tech in the fall of 2016 after completing her final class.

"I don't know if donors realize how many people they impact positively when they start a scholarship fund," Fritch said. "It makes such a huge difference in their lives."

Donors who establish scholarships, especially for non-traditional students who are trying to improve their lives, are making such a huge impact on people, even with a \$500 scholarship," Fritch said. "I remember when I received my first scholarship. I realized that I could take two classes that semester, not just one. It was wonderful."

Fritch also says more than 50 percent of the students she's seen in her classes have been in her age group. She knows other students also value the non-traditional scholarships even more than her.

"Some people are working two or three jobs and they have children or grandchildren to take care of, or they may be taking care of an elderly parent," Fritch said. "The scholarship allows them to pay for a class and frees up the money to let them hire a baby sitter or someone to watch a parent, so they can go to school."

Fritch says simply receiving the scholarships also gave her a sense of confidence that she could accomplish her goal. "I've always spent time giving back to others and causes in the community," she said. "Receiving two scholarships let me know exactly how it felt to receive something from the kindness of others. I really appreciate the help."

There are many ways to get involved in the Dearborn Community Foundation's efforts to make a difference in Dearborn County.


■ Become Aware: Learn more about how the Foundation helps donors achieve their charitable goals and the positive impact of the results.
