DEARBORN COMMUNITY FOUNDATION IN TOP PHILANTHROPIC TIER NATIONALLY Receives National Accreditation for Rigorous Philanthropic Standards

The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc., (DCF) in early 2020 was reaccredited with the nation's highest standard for philanthropic excellence. The notice comes from the National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations®, which establishes legal, ethical, and effective practices for community foundations everywhere.

"Meeting the National Standards benchmarks is a rigorous, comprehensive process," said Randy Royster, board member of the Council on Foundations. "This accredi-

tation is a significant accomplishment that indicates Dearborn Community Foundation demonstrates a commitment to transparency, quality, integrity and accountability as it carries out its mission."

The National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations® program requires community foundations to document their policies for donor services, investments, grantmaking and administration. With more than 500 community foundations already accredited na-Excellence. Accountability. Impact.^{*}

tionwide, the program is designed to provide

quality assurance to donors, as well as to their legal and financial advisors. "This is very important to our donors," said Fred McCarter, Executive Director of the Dearborn Community Foundation. "When people make a charitable bequest, establish an endowment fund or set up an annuity, they are putting their trust in us. They are counting on us to manage the investment wisely and to honor their charitable wishes. The National Standards confirmation says our house is in order."

DCF, which was first accredited with the National Stan-



dards seal in 2009, offers a range of charitable funds, allowing donors to advance a cause such as education or the environment, support an individual organization, provide flexible support for community needs or recommend individual grants. In addition to affirming the organization's philanthropic services, the confirmation validates the Foundation's grant-making practices for the non-profit community.

"Some say it's easier to create wealth than to give money

away wisely," McCarter said. "There's some truth in that. Grant-making is a lot like investing ... we need to assess risks, weigh potential gains, diversify assets, monitor performance and operate fairly. When you see the National Standards Seal, you can be assured that we're committed to meeting the highest standards for grantmaking as well."

DCF IS YOUR PARTNER IN PHILANTHROPY

The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) offers its services to donors and professional advisors to help them fulfill their philanthropic wishes and maximize their benefits. DCF is committed to making your charitable giving a pleasurable and easy experience. The Foundation can discuss various gift vehicles and help find the best gift methods to meet donors' charitable, financial and estate planning goals.

The Foundation with assets of nearly \$22.6 million, administers 150 endowment funds. Each endowment fund is established by a separate agreement and is accounted for individually. The funds are designed to carry out the philanthropic dream of the founding contributors. The corpus of a fund is pooled with other funds for investment purposes. Distributions from the fund in the form of grants, scholarships, or payments to designated non-profit agencies are made each year.

Donors' wishes vary from the granting of scholarships in the name of a deceased loved one to designated and field of interest endowments that provide assistance to a particular non-profit organization or cause. By establishing an endowment, a donor can create a source of income for a fund's purpose in perpetuity.

DCF AWARDS MORE THAN \$1.4 MILLION IN GRANTS DURING 2019

Dearborn Community Foundation (DCF) awarded 189 grants totaling more than \$1.4 million to non-profit organizations in 2019. The grants support the needs/interests of the community in the fields of: Art, Culture and Humanities, Community and Public Benefit, Education, Environment and Animal Protection, Human Services, Public Safety and Youth Programs.

The Foundation considers awarded grants to be investments in our community. DCF grants benefit the community in a variety of ways and for more than two decades have had a major impact on the lives of the people in our community.

The majority of Foundation funds awarded to non-profit organizations are discretionary grants for which DCF conducts a competitive review and decision-making process. These grants are administered by DCF through non-permanent grant programs. Generous contributions from both the City of Lawrenceburg and the City of Aurora provide the funding for the non-permanent grant programs. DCF's administration of the non-permanent programs helps both donors achieve their charitable goals. The remaining grants are awarded based on recommendations by donors and are paid out of endowment funds established by donors. Figures for total grants awarded in 2019 also include designated endowment fund distributions and grants administered by DCF for the Lawrenceburg Schools Endowment Corporation.

The Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Program is the result of a statewide Lilly Endowment, Inc. initiative to help raise the level of educational attainment in Indiana; to increase the awareness of the beneficial roles Indiana community foundations can play in their communities; and to encourage and support the efforts of current and past Lilly Endowment Scholars to engage with each other and with Indiana business, governmental, educational, not-for-profit and civic leaders to improve the quality of life in Indiana generally and in local communities throughout the state. Since the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarships were first offered in 1998, the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) has been pleased to award the scholarships to Dearborn County students graduating from high school. In 2019, DCF was eligible to nominate a recipient and alternates for one full-tuition scholarship.

The Lilly Endowment Inc. program provides scholarships for full tuition, required fees, and a special allocation of up to \$900 per year for required books and equipment for four years of undergraduate study on a fulltime basis, leading to a baccalaureate degree at any Indiana public or private college or university accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. The 2019 Lilly Endowment Community Scholar: Lila Socks, a graduate of South Dearborn High School, is currently attending Indiana University's Hamilton-Lugar School of Global and International Studies. Lila is studying Pre-Law with plans to pursue a career in International Law.

It is important to note that Molly Graham, an East Central High School graduate, was originally chosen as a recipient of the Lilly Community Scholarship. However, Graham turned down the scholarship to pursue her post-secondary education outside the State of Indiana. The Lilly scholarship must be used at an Indiana college, so after much consideration, Graham chose to attend an educational institution outside of Indiana and decline the Lilly scholarship. When Graham declined the scholarship, the Independent Colleges of Indiana (ICI) scholarship guidelines for the Lilly Scholarship kicked into gear. The guidelines call for DCF to also select a first and second alternate in case a student like Graham, choses to decline the scholarship. Socks was the first alternate approved by the DCF Board of Directors.

The Dearborn Community Foundation's 2019 Donor Appreciation Dinner was an opportunity to thank donors and volunteers, and to seek input from community members in the Foundation's effort to become an even more engaged community leader.

"I'm proud to say our Community Foundation now safeguards 150 endowment funds totaling nearly \$18 million," said Fred McCarter, DCF Executive Director. "Thanks to our donors, the Foundation has awarded more than \$40 million in grants and scholarships in our 21-year history."

McCarter also told those in attendance "thanks, in part, to grant funding from Lilly Endowment Inc.'s GIFT (Giving Indiana Funds for Tomorrow) VII initiative, the Foundation leaders have committed to becoming even more engaged as a leader in the community. Through more outreach and convenings in our community, we believe more collaborations will occur leading to the betterment of our community," he added.

As a part of the GIFT VII initiative, DCF received a \$50,000 Community Leadership Planning Grant in 2019, which allowed Foundation staff and board of directors along with other volunteers and community leaders to increase community knowledge, connections and to improve general knowledge and skills in the area of community development and leadership to better serve the community and donors.

"The planning grant afforded us the ability to improve as a leader and collaborator in the Dearborn County community," McCarter said. "While the Foundation has never shied away from leading or collaborating, this is an opportunity to grow in those areas and, perhaps, to learn to be even more proactive in these areas."

DCF worked hard to learn more about Dearborn County's strengths and weaknesses through outreach efforts in 2019, and plans to continue similar efforts to engage more with the community members on an ongoing basis. In fact, the dinner was the largest of the community convenings in 2019, as DCF asked those in attendance to complete a survey to help assess the county's strengths and weaknesses.

At the dinner, DCF also inducted nine members into the Legacy Society for establishment of endowment funds, and honored five community members as Heart of Gold Award recipients for their volunteer good works in the community. The Foundation also was able to raise more than \$7,000 in new unrestricted endowment through the net proceeds of the dinner.



Elaine Kroger passed away in January of 2020 at the age of 93. Elaine was a former member of DCF board of directors and also served on committees, including the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Committee. She was always more than willing to volunteer at the Foundation and loved the time she spent on the scholarship committee. As retired educator, she always enjoyed interacting with scholarship applicants and recipients.

"Elaine was always wonderful to work with," said Fred McCarter, DCF Executive Director. "She put her heart and soul into her volunteerism at the Foundation and elsewhere. It was always a pleasure to work with Elaine. Her smile was infectious."

McCarter said Elaine loved serving on the scholarship committee and helped set the standard for how the committee has operated for many years. "She was always excited to interview students and interact with them during the scholarship process. Elaine's willingness to help others certainly made an indelible impact on many of us."

Elaine retired from teaching after a career at St. Johns Lutheran School in Aurora. YOUTH COUNCIL

YOUTH COUNCIL MAKES A DIFFERENCE IN DEARBORN COUNTY

The DCF Youth Council completed its seventh year in 2019, continuing to make a difference in Dearborn County through both community service and fundraising/ grant-making. The Youth Council has completed hundreds of hours of community service and in its seven-year history has contributed \$15,000 in grants to charitable organizations that make a difference in the community.

The Youth Council, which is made up of high-school age youth (grades 9-12) from across the county, was established by DCF in 2012 to involve youth in a meaningful way in the philanthropic tradition, to encourage young people to give and serve in their community, and to make philanthropy a habit of the heart for future generations. The goal is for the Council to be self-sufficient and youth-ran with DCF staff and volunteers giving guidance and direction where needed. The Council is guided by the three ideals of giving and serving, leadership development, and community engagement.

The Youth Council has raised more than \$20,000 in seven years through fundraisers. The Council often splits funds raised between other charitable organizations in the community and the DCF Youth Council Endowment Fund. The endowment fund has grown to a value of nearly \$20,000. Youth Council members annually make grant recommendations from the



fund to worthy causes in the community. Youth Council grants have been made to local food pantries, Safe Passage, the Pregnancy Care Center, Partners for Animal Welfare Society of Dearborn County (PAWS), Special Olympics Indiana, Big Brothers Big Sisters, James B. Wismann Y.E.S. Home, Children's Advocacy Center of Southeastern Indiana, Pregnancy Care Center, and the Lauren Hill Make A Difference Fund at DCF. The Council also annually completes a Pen-Pal project with eighth graders.

Youth Council members learn the value of philanthropy and that setting aside funds for the needs of future generations through endowment is vital. The Council's endowment fund has grown significantly through the hard work of the youth, volunteer coordinator Denise Sedler, other volunteers, and Foundation staff. Sedler, a former Foundation staffer,

was instrumental in the establishment of the Youth Council during her time as the DCF Program Director. The Council annually completes community impact projects which combine community outreach, community service and fundraising to support charitable organizations. In 2019-2020, the youth chose to have an impact on organizations, like the YES Home, the Dearborn County Clearinghouse for Emergency Aid, Inc., the Pregnancy Care Center, nursing homes, and PAWS. Youth Council members also make a philanthropy presentation to fifth and sixth grade students at St. Mary's School, Aurora, to express how the elementary students could make a difference in the community.
