The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc., (DCF) in 2022 was reaccredited with the nation's highest standard for philanthropic excellence. The notice comes from the Community Foundations National Standards®, which establishes legal, ethical, and effective practices for community foundations everywhere.

"Meeting the National Standards benchmarks is a rigorous, comprehensive process," said Susie Nelson, board

chair of the National Standards. "This accreditation is a significant accomplishment that indicates Dearborn Community Foundation demonstrates a commitment to transparency, quality, integrity and accountability as it carries out its mission."

The Community Foundations National Standards® program requires community foundations to document their policies for donor services, investments, grant-making and administration. With more than 500 community foundations already accredited nationwide, the program is designed to provide quality assurance to donors, as well as to their legal and financial advisors.

DCF, which was first accredited with the National Standards seal in 2009, offers a range of charitable funds, allowing donors to advance a cause such as education or the environment, support an individual organization, provide flexible support for community needs or recommend individual grants. In addition to affirming the organization's philanthropic services, the confirmation validates the Foundation's grant-making practices for the non-profit community.

"Some say it's easier to create wealth than

to give money away wisely,"

McCarter said. "There's some truth in that. Grant-making is a lot like investing ... we need to assess risks, weigh potential gains, diversify assets, monitor performance, and operate fairly. When you see the National Standards Seal, you can be assured that we're committed to meeting the highest standards for grantmaking as well."

DCF IS YOUR PARTNER IN PHILANTHROPY

The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) offers its services to donors and professional advisors to help them fulfill their philanthropic wishes and maximize their benefits. DCF is committed to making your charitable giving a pleasurable and easy experience. The Foundation can discuss various gift vehicles and help find the best gift methods to meet donors' charitable, financial and estate planning goals.

The Foundation with assets of \$28.7 million, administers 167 endowment funds. Each endowment fund is established by a separate agreement and is accounted for individually. The funds are designed to carry out the philanthropic dream of the founding contributors. The corpus of a fund is pooled with other funds for investment purposes. Distributions from the fund in the form of grants, scholarships, or payments to designated non-profit agencies are made each year.

Donors' wishes vary from the granting of scholarships in the name of a deceased loved one to designated and field of interest endowments that provide assistance to a particular non-profit organization or cause. By establishing an endowment, a donor can create a source of income for a fund's purpose in perpetuity.

DCF AWARDS \$46 MILLION IN GRANTS IN 25 YEARS

Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) has awarded \$46 million in grants in its 25 years of helping donors make a difference in Dearborn County. The millions of dollars in grants have been made to non-profit organizations to support the needs/interests of the community in the fields of: Art, Culture and Humanities, Community and Public Benefit, Education, Environment and Animal Protection, Human Services, Public Safety and Youth Programs. The Foundation considers awarded grants to be investments in our community. DCF grants benefit the community in a variety of ways and over the past 25 years have had a major impact on the lives of the people in our community.

In 2022 alone, DCF awarded 177 grants to non-profits totaling more than \$1.2 million to non-profit organizations. The majority of Foundation funds awarded to non-profit organizations are discretionary grants for which DCF conducts a competitive review and decision-making process. These grants are administered by DCF through non-permanent grant programs. Generous contributions from the City of Lawrenceburg provide the funding for the non-permanent grant programs. DCF's administration of the non-permanent programs helps the donor achieve their charitable goals. The remaining grants are awarded based on recommendations by donors and are paid out of endowment funds established by donors. Figures for total grants awarded in 2022 also include designated endowment fund distributions and grants administered by DCF for the Lawrenceburg Schools Endowment Corporation.

LILLY ENDOWMENT COMMUNITY SCHOLARSHIP

The Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Program is the result of a statewide Lilly Endowment Inc. initiative to help raise the level of educational attainment in Indiana; to increase the awareness of the beneficial roles Indiana community foundations can play in their communities; and to encourage and support the efforts of current and past Lilly Endowment Scholars to engage with each other and with Indiana business, governmental, educational, not-for-profit and civic leaders to improve the quality of life in Indiana generally and in local communities throughout the state.

Since the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarships were first offered in 1998, the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. (DCF) has been pleased





REMEMBERING FRIENDS

REMEMBERING OUR SPECIAL FRIEND

The Dearborn Community Foundation (DCF) lost a dear friend in October 2, 2022, with the passing of former board member Dr. Frank L. Frable Jr., 97 of Aurora. Dr. Frable was a dedicated husband, father, and surgeon who touched many lives in Dearborn County and South-eastern Indiana. He will be remembered for his outstanding care to his patients and his passion for learning.

Dr. Frable was a founding member of the DCF Board of Directors and served on the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Committee for several years. He also was honored as a Friend of the Foundation in 2003 shortly before his term as a board member ended. The Friend of the Foundation honor is to recognize individuals that have been strong supporters of the Foundation for a significant period.

"I had the distinct honor of serving on the DCF Board with Dr. Frable prior to becoming executive director," said McCarter. "He played a very important role as a member of the board, as he always thought things through and politely encouraged other volunteers and the staff to do the same. He truly cared about the community, and he wanted DCF to be successful. When he spoke, we all listened!"

It was clear that Dr. Frable loved serving on the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Committee, McCarter said. "As a member of the Lilly Scholarship Committee, Dr. Frable was a part of an early group of volunteers who helped to set the standard for how we score and award scholarships. He enjoyed interacting with students during the interview process. He also helped in creating policies that are still used today." Born August 1, 1925, in New York City, Frable's family moved to Ohio, West Virginia, and settled in Highland Park, Illinois, a suburb north of Chicago. Before graduating high school in 1943, he was admitted to the University of Illinois. By 1944, he was drafted into the Navy and served as an Electronics Technician Mate 3rd class. He was an avid boxer in the Navy, earning the name "Fightingest Fighter Navy Pier" in 1945.

Dr. Frable's growing family moved to Aurora in 1959 with Dearborn County Hospital just opening its doors. As a general surgeon, Dr. Frable practiced medicine from 1951 to 2000.

During his tenure at Dearborn County Hospital, he served as Chief of Surgery and Chief of Staff. He was the last standing physician of those who opened Dearborn County Hospital.

Dr. Frable was active in the community church, served on the school board, and in later years was part of the Aurora City Planning Commission and the Dearborn County Health Commission. Dr. Frable's wife of 63 years, the Reverend Jean Hyde Frable, preceded him in death. He is survived by a brother; his seven children; seven grandchildren; and five great grandchildren.

TREMAIN SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS MORE THAN \$5 MILLION IN 20 YEARS

The Paul E. "Truck" Tremain Memorial Scholarship Program has awarded more than \$5 million to 1,060 Lawrenceburg High School graduates with post-secondary education costs in the last 20 years. The Tremain Scholarship, which is funded by the City of Lawrenceburg, has been administered by the Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc. since 2002. The scholarship amount has been in the range of \$1,400 to \$1,800 per year for each recipient. The scholarship is renewable for up to four years as long as students continue to meet all established eligibility criteria. Scholarships for the year 2022 were up to \$1,800 per recipient. A total of 100 students received the scholarship in 2022 totaling \$179,008 in scholarships awarded.

The Tremain Scholarship, which was originally named the Lawrenceburg Educational Grant, was renamed in 2012 in tribute to former Lawrenceburg Mayor the late Paul E. Tremain Sr., who was instrumental in creating the scholarship. While the City of Lawrenceburg annually funds the Tremain Scholarship, an endowment, the Paul E. "Truck" Tremain Memorial Scholarship Fund, also supports the program.

It is the City of Lawrenceburg's intent through the Tremain Scholarship to financially assist eligible graduates of Lawrenceburg High School who pursue a post-secondary education which includes, but is not necessarily limited to, any 4-year school, 2-year school, oneyear certificate program or apprenticeship program. Students give back to the community through volunteer service during their high school years as part of the eligibility requirements. Some of the organizations that students have volunteered for include Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Dearborn County, PAWS, and Special Olympics. Through 2022 Lawrenceburg High School Students have provided more than 50,000 community service hours to many worthy organizations and causes in Dearborn County.

"Those of us who knew Paul Tremain know that he was very passionate about how the city could impact the future of young people and the community as a whole," said Fred McCarter, Executive Director of DCF. "Paul would be quite proud that city leaders over the years have continued this successful scholarship program."

The Lawrenceburg City Council established an endowment to support the Paul E. "Truck" Tremain Memorial Scholarship in early 2012. Anyone can contribute to the endowment that was established to provide funds to support the scholarship in

perpetuity. Contributions should be sent to DCF at 322 Walnut Street, Lawrenceburg, IN 47025. Checks should be written to DCF with a note that the donation is to the Paul E. "Truck" Tremain Memorial Scholarship Fund. Donations can also be made online at dearborncf.org.

"Contributing to the Paul E. "Truck" Tremain Memorial Scholarship Fund is an opportunity for students and parents, who have already benefitted from the scholarship, to give back," McCarter said.

DCFBOARD OF DIRECTORS 2022 BOARD MEMBERS REPRESENT ALL CORNERS OF DEARBORN COUNTY

The Dearborn Community Foundation, Inc.'s (DCF) Board of Directors is made up of volunteers from all corners of Dearborn County, supporting the Foundation's primary purpose of building permanent endowment funds to serve donors who have charitable interests.

There were 15 members of the board during 2022. Directors are elected for three-year terms beginning with the annual meeting held in January of each year with approximately a third of the terms ending each year. A director may serve a maximum of two full consecutive terms of service. The terms are staggered to provide continuity of experience.

Board members are elected by the board after it receives recommendations from the Board Development Committee which is charged with seeking talented leaders who are representative of the community.

HEART OF GOLD HONOREES

Mindy Bruce, Aurora: is a compassionate servant leader, who is thorough in everything she does to help others in the community. Mindy had been involved with Relay for Life, an annual event that raises funds for the fight against cancer, for many years but things got a bit more personal in 2010 when her husband, Les, was diagnosed with Lymphoma. After her husband's diagnosis and treatment, Bruce decided to attend the Relay for Life kick-off meeting to learn how to get more involved. The rest is history! "It's a great feeling to help others, said Bruce." What she does in her leadership role is very important to survivors, others who have cancer, and their family members. Mindy has also been guite involved as a volunteer for Aurora Fire Department including the fundraising for the fire department's two scholarships for high school seniors that are awarded annually through the South Dearborn Dollars for Scholars organization. Bruce is humble about her time spent volunteering to help others, explaining that she "gets satisfaction helping others, and so many others do more than I do in the community." She also credits influences like her parents, grandfather, and aunt for setting examples of community service. She wants to set an example for her fouryear-old daughter Bailey. "We need to remember to teach our young people to help others out."

Bill Ward, St. Leon: Bill retired 17 years ago as a plant manager for a plastics manufacturing firm, but he really hasn't retired from working. Some might say he's "working for the Master." People who know Bill say the word compassion comes up when they think of him. He asks what else can be done to help people in need and does it with respect. Bill has been a volunteer at North Dearborn Pantry Board for about 17 years. He spent many years in leadership roles and currently serves as a volunteer chief financial officer of sorts and as a truck driver, picking up food donations one to two times a week. He along with his wife of 47 years, Teresa, are involved in many other special events/fundraisers at North Dearborn Pantry. He's also been a major volunteer all nine vears of the annual Thanksgiving Day All Saints Parish Gobble Wobble 5K run/walk that raises funds for North Dearborn and Sunman pantries along with a pantry at East Central High School. An example of how Ward's unique, genuine way of showing appreciation to others who support North Dearborn Pantry is how he takes the time to hand write thank you notes to many contributors. His volunteerism doesn't stop at the Pantry, Bill and his wife are members of All Saints Parish and often partner in doing good for others such as mentoring young couples engaged for marriage for the past 37 years. The Ward's also have been involved with the Pregnancy Care Center in Lawrenceburg. Bill was a part of the Man-2-Man mentoring program. Bill is also a former DCF Board member, serving several years as Treasurer. Currently he's a member of the Foundation's Investment and Grants committees. Ward says family, especially his dad, and friends have provided him with great examples of doing for others without expecting anything in return. When asked why he lends a hand to others, Ward said: "Ultimately, it's to bring glory to God!'

Logan Lawrence, Lawrenceburg: Logan is held up as an example to students at Lawrenceburg High School of how you can accomplish anything if you set your mind to it. Lawrence, now 23, at the age of 17 organized the Cruisin to A Cure for ALS car show in memory of his grandfather Carlos Lawrence. The car show raises funds designated for ALS research and to support those who are battling the incurable disease. The car show has grown from 400 registered vehicles in its first year to more than 800 while raising \$190,000 in six years. Logan does a great job with the students who volunteer at the Car Show. He's a leader, a great role model and empowers them to take charge and lead too. Lawrence says his grandfather, who died of ALS at the age of 67, when he was not quite 10 years of age, was a role model to him. His grandfather's death was very hard on him. With the car show, Logan just wanted to give back and make a difference for others dealing with ALS and do it in his grandfather's memory. As a kid he spent a lot of time around his grandfather and his father, and it usually had something to do with cars and racing, he said. "It made sense to have a car show fundraiser." The car show not only has raised thousands of dollars for both research and to support those fighting ALS, but it also brings awareness to the incurable disease. Lawrence does the budgeting, marketing, and most of the planning of the annual car show that draws thousands of visitors to downtown Lawrenceburg. Logan recognizes the importance of the 75 plus volunteers to make the show the success that it is. Lawrence supports his community in other ways too. As a Systems Engineer he was one of the first to offer help at the JAG Career Fair at Lawrenceburg High School. People that know Logan say he's always ready to help and he never expects anything in return for what he does in the community.
